

Eddie's interest in horticulture evolved as a result of his education, and work experiences. These wideranging experiences included a position as an educational environmentalist, a job with Davey Tree, and managing a garden center. Posting items of horticultural interest on social media put him in touch again with a fellow high school student, Dave Baxter, who became Eddie's introduction to Red Oak Camp and Lantern Court.

Eddie envisions growing Lantern Court's presence as a gardening and nature hub, a space for environmentalists and educators, through outreach and educational programs. The biggest challenge today is attracting volunteers to help with the management of plant life on the property. The very happy perennials on this property are engaged in "sleep-creep-leap", which Eddie views as both good and bad. Ultimately, Eddie hopes to replace aging and/or dying plants with native plants.

Eddie's favorite tree? The black maple, a sub-species of the sugar maple. He has fond childhood memories of this tree in his yard in Willoughby. Ask him precisely how much he likes this tree! Maybe he'll show you. Eddie's favorite flower: Verbena, a major attractor for pollinators.

A favorite hiking spot: the Beaver Marsh in the Cuyahoga Valley National Park. Formerly a chemical waste dump, it is now a thriving wetland, inhabited by beaver, otters, and wood ducks, among others. Ask Eddie about "rucking", and his favorite trips in the wild

Kirtland's Lantern Court Finds New Purpose, Needs Volunteers By Carol Poh

The club's first meeting of 2023, on Jan. 9, featured an illustrated presentation by Eddie Lagucki, the director of horticulture at Lantern Court in Kirtland. He was tapped to fill the new position last May in anticipation of Holden Arboretum's transfer of the property (deemed tangential to its mission) to Red Oak Camp in July. The youthful and engaging Lagucki described himself as "a Cleveland native, ISA Certified Arborist, avid wildlife photographer, and major outdoor enthusiast." His passion for gardening shone through as he described the Lantern Court volunteer program.

The history of Lantern Court, located on the south side of Kirtland-Chardon Road opposite the arboretum, and the adjacent Red Oak Camp are closely intertwined. The camp was begun 1947 by boys attending Hawken School. In 1952, it came under the patronage of its neighbor, the financier and philanthropist Warren H. Corning II, who acquired 87 acres to support the venture. In 1957 Corning's daughter, Alison, established Chincapin, a camp for girls. The Cornings resided nearby on their 25-acre Lantern Court estate, where in 1931 they had built a large Georgian-style house (designed by Edward Maier). The house and its outbuildings were surrounded by formal and naturalistic gardens built to the design of the noted Cleveland landscape architect A. Donald Gray (1891—1939). Gray designed many private gardens and estates in Cleveland and its suburbs, as well as Forest Hill Park on the former site of John D. Rockefeller's summer home.

For three decades, until his death in 1975, Warren Corning was a driving force behind Holden Arboretum, acquiring hundreds of acres for its use and serving as its executive head in the 1940s and 50s and, later, as chair of its executive committee. In 1966 the Cornings leased their Lantern Court estate to the arboretum for \$1 a year, allowing it to expand its educational and cultural programs. (The family had downsized to a remodeled farmhouse nearby.)

Today the elegant Lantern Court estate remains remarkably intact—down to the original furnishings inside the house—and the hand of Donald Gray is still to be seen in the gardens. But the estate's addition to Red Oak Camp's holdings presents new challenges. Following a visual tour of the property's landscape features, Lagucki described diverse volunteer opportunities. These include perennial garden maintenance, an adopt-a-garden program, propagation and transplanting activities, education (garden tours), and trail maintenance. Crab Cake Recipe, Bob McMahon

Ingredients:

- 1 pound of lump crab meat
- 3 Tablespoons of flour
- 4 shakes of Worcestershire Sauce
- 1 egg
- 1 Tablespoon chopped parsley (or dried)
- 1 Tablespoon of Dijon mustard
- 2 generous Tablespoons of mayonnaise
- 1 Tablespoon of Old Bay Seasoning
- Olive/vegetable oil to cover skillet



Place crab meat in a bowl and sort through for any extraneous shells and avoid breaking up the lumps of crab meat.

In another bowl, mix the remaining ingredients, except the oil, and whisk together until blended and smooth. Carefully fold in the crab meat into the wet mixture, being careful again not to break up the lumps of crab meat.

Gently shape 5 to 6 cakes from the mixture, placing the crab cakes on a piece of waxed paper. Chill at last for an hour; several hours is better for the cakes to firm up somewhat.

Heat the oil in a skillet over medium-high heat. When a droplet of water spatters upon contact with the hot oil (important that the oil be very hot), the crab cakes can be carefully placed in the skillet using a spatula. Sauté a skillet full of crab cakes until golden brown on one side. Carefully turn over the crab cakes and sauté on the other side until golden brown and cooked all the way through. Remove and drain on paper towels, if need be, and enjoy!
