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LEARNING FROM OUR OWN MEMBERSby Carol Poh

The Oct<mark>ober 14 program of the Gardeners of Greater Cl</mark>eveland drew on the expertise of four of our club members, each of whom offered seven-minute presentations on diverse subjects.

Deborah Kramarz, a retired teacher, reprised a talk she gave earlier this year to elementary-school students visiting Water Pollution Control, Cleveland's storm water manager, which promotes native plants as a storm water management best practice. Deb's theme was "Clean Water Rooted in Nature." She explained, in simple terms, that because grass roots are short—only about two inches—storm water runs off lawns into the street; from there, it goes into the sewer, and then into Lake Erie, carrying with it any fertilizer or pesticides that may have been applied. That is how the lake becomes polluted. And Lake Erie is where we get our drinking water. ("Most kids don't know that," she said.) Deb then shared "nature's solution" to water pollution: "You can 'shrink' your lawn by planting flowers instead," she told them. "Native plants are best because they have longer roots, which absorb and clean storm water before it goes into the lake." To illustrate the concept, she called on volunteers. Several garden club members stepped up. Each was given a card representing a species of native plants to which a length of hemp twine had been wrapped. The volunteers were asked, in turn, to unfurl the twine, revealing the long, thirsty roots of (among other examples) Goldenrod (7 to 8 feet long), Purple Coneflower (also 7 to 8 feet), and Blazing Star (an astonishing 18 feet long),* putting grass roots to shame.

Steve McIntosh, GoGC president, described the Learning Garden program he established and has operated at Cuyahoga Falls High School (Summit County) since 2015. Steve, who teaches urban agriculture, began the program to provide students and teachers with a fresh opportunity to meet learning standards and empower students to take ownership of their education by using the learning garden as an extension of the classroom. Students apply what they learn in the classroom—including biology, math, language arts, and art—to everything from the construction of raised beds to crop selection and soil testing. Begun on a small scale with the help of foundation funding, this year the high school's Fresh Farm program donated 3,000 pounds of produce to area food pantries (15,000 pounds since 2018).

plantsman, discussed how to keep house plants happy by keeping their roots healthy. Soil provides nutrition, air, and drainage. He recommends Happy Frog potting soil, which claims to be "amended with soil microbes that can help improve root efficiency and encourage nutrient uptake." Because 80 to 90 percent of a plant is water, Bob emphasized the importance of measuring the dryness of the soil before watering. Fortunately, he said, each of us is equipped with a "meter" to gauge when to water: use a finger. He recommended feeding plants intermittently from April through September using any all-purpose plant food, such as Miracle-Gro or Vigoro.

Eddie Lagucki brought the program to a close, demonstrating the construction of nesting boxes for Bluebirds and Tree Swallows. Both species are prevalent at Lantern Court and Red Oak Camp in Lake County, where Eddie is lead horticulturist. According to the Ohio Bluebird Society, Bluebirds are cavity nesters, searching out tree hollows and stumps to build their nests. As humans increasingly destroy such natural nesting sites, naturalists encourage people to erect bluebird boxes to help maintain and grow populations of bluebirds for generations to come. Eddie presented slides showing construction techniques and passed around a nesting box for examination. Information on siting, building, and mounting nesting boxes can be found of the website of the Ohio Bluebird Society.

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VA SPINAL CHORD UNIT GARDEN FALL UPDATE, BOB McMahon

On the beautiful warm morning of October 22, GoGC members Tim Homan, Larry Kell and Bob McMahon purchased 24-8" flowering mums and 8-8" ornamental kale from the Lakewood Garden Center that were planted later that morning at the Cleveland VA Hospital's Spinal Cord Injury Unit courtyard gardens. Garden center owner and fellow GoGC member, Paul Bilyk, gave a generous discount on the purchase for his support for this commendable cause. Thank you, Paul!

The mums and kale were planted in the four large raised beds, replacing the spent vegetable crops; in several containers, replacing spent flowers; and in a ground bed where sweet potatoes and sweet corn had been grown. Staff member, Alexandrea Simmons, assisted in the planting. No veterans were available to assist, but Alexandrea assured us that they would be out to enjoy the plantings later that afternoon. Photos are attached showing the new plantings. Most of the herbs and flowers planted in May (also purchased from the Lakewood Garden Center at a generous discount!) were still going strong, with the herbs continuing to be used by the kitchen and the flowers continuing to add beauty to the courtyard, now along with the mums and kale. Alexandrea thanked us profusely and told us how she and the veterans are so grateful for our club's efforts to provide healthy food and beautiful flowers for them. That is really our club's reward! We also want to thank the Euclid Veterans for funding this noteworthy project!
